KINDERGARTEN SCREENING - The Watertown School District will register and screen prospective kindergarteners on April 14th, 15th, and 16th at Garfield School. All children who live in the Watertown School District and who will be 5 years of age on or before September 1st, 2010, and who will be attending the public school should register for a screening time. Please call Garfield © 882-6399 to set up your child's appointment.
Registration and screening will take approximately one hour to complete. The children will need to wear tennis shoes for the motor skills portion of the screening. Parents are asked to remain in attendance until registration and screening of their child is complete.
In order to complete registration, parents must bring a certified birth certificate (not hospital certificate) with them when they register. Parents must also present a record of immunizations. Children may not start school without a completed up-to-date immunization record. Remember that the Chicken Pox vaccines need to be given months apart. Please start early completing your child's last required shots.
PRESCHOOL SCREENING - Preschool screening will be held at McKinley School on Friday, May 7th, and Friday, May 14th from 8:00 am-4:00 pm. It is for children who will be 4 years of age on or before September 1st, 2010. Please bring a certified birth certificate (not hospital certificate) and immunization records. Please call McKinley School @ 882-6350 to set up your child's appointment.
ATTENDANCE - Thank you parents for making school a top priority in your child's life. By building the habit of daily attendance, you will help your child see that school is important. Learning builds day by day. A child who misses a day of school also misses a day of learning.

## Identifying Your Child's Gifts and Talents

Step 3: Note only the positive about your child.
Assessing a child's weaknesses and areas of trouble is a valid and important activity for educational purposes. However, in this realm, it is suggested that you look only at the positive. Sure, this can be hard to do, especially for a child who has a knack for "pressing your buttons," or who displays a significant number of negative traits in his/her behavioral repertoire. But once you start the process, it becomes easier and easier,
followed by noteworthy benefits. The following questions may help you get started. When looking for areas of strength, you might ask yourself:
Does my child make friends easily?
Does my child seem interested in the larger social world, rather than just the immediate surroundings?
Does my child have stick-to-it-iveness when it comes to projects?
Is my child well-organized?
Does my child have a passion for music or art?
Is my child good at solving problems that he/she encounters?
Does my child have an unusually kind heart?
Does my child seem to especially enjoy physical activities?
Does my child feel comfortable talking in front of groups?
Do peers tend to follow my child's lead?
Does my child love to build things?
Does my child seem most happy being outside?


Does my child think math is "fun"?
Does my child love to write?
To get an accurate portrait of your child, devise a schedule that is convenient for you to make your observations. It is recommended that you observe your child at different times throughout the day; as well as in different settings and situations. After you begin to feel comfortable with a procedure of this type, it can become part of the way in which you parent - your "parenting" style, so to speak.

As children start kindergarten, parents are quite involved with their education. We attend conferences, cheer on our children at school concerts and events, and hang up schoolwork in the family art gallery: the refrigerator. But sometimes we distance ourselves from school as our children grow older. They're supposed to learn to be independent. Right?

Kids are more likely to grow up healthy when parents stay actively involved in their education. When Watertown High School Students took the Search Survey in the fall of 2008, $30 \%$ reported that they have parental involvement in their schooling.

Parents can stay involved in small ways that will make a big difference. For example:
Maintain ongoing communication with your child's teacher(s). Call to check every other month-before trouble appears. E-mail is a wonderful communication tool!
Join the PTO. If you can't volunteer a lot of time, say so. Being involved helps everyone feel more connected to the school!
Volunteer to help in small ways. Check with your child's teacher or school's administrative assistant for opportunities.
Volunteer to speak on career day.
Attend all conferences. If you can't make it on the designated date, arrange to meet at another time.
Remember, your children are proud of you and love having the chance to show you off to their teachers and principal. You make a difference by staying involved!
