From the Principal's Desk:

An often overlooked component to the success of a child at school is their attendance. There are unforeseen situations that impact attendance and that is understood. The school is empathetic to these situations and will work with parents to accommodate the situation. However, your help is needed! WE are developing life skills that will impact a child's futuristic job. A strong correlation has been researched to show that attendance problems in school will carry over to the adult world. I recently read an article on how patterns set in kindergarten to grade three set the attitude that "the job" isn't that important. The students hear me say quite often that school is their job. It is one of my goals to ensure that we do everything possible to have students attend school. This includes monitoring each child's attendance and issuing letters. I realize that there are times when your child may make things difficult for you and not want to attend. Call the school and we will come and pick them up. Please read the following regarding attendance letters:

ATTENDANCE LETTERS

The Watertown School District's Board of Education has adopted a board policy encouraging all students to be in school every day that school is in session. The administration realizes that there are times when it is impossible for students to attend school. (sickness, funerals, unique trips, etc.) The following are guidelines that are used when issuing attendance letters and detentions for unexcused tardies and absences.

LETTER	ABSENCES	TARDIES

FIRST 2 unexcused OR 6 unexcused/excused combined 3 unexcused OR 6 unexcused combined

SECOND 3 unexcused OR I2 unexcused/excused combined 4 unexcused OR 8 unexcused/excused combined

THIRD Truancy filed 4 unexcused OR 18 unexcused/excused combined 5 unexcused OR 10 unexcused/excused combined

Detention will be assigned to each unexcused absence or tardy thereafter.

Promptness to class is VERY IMPORTANT! It is important that students arrive at school on time at the beginning of the day. A student is considered tardy if they arrive after 8:35 AM or ten minutes after their lunch period ends. Parents will be contacted due to being continually tardy.
