Eric attended school in Wilmot until the age of eleven, and then went to the Children's Care Hospital and School in Sioux Falls, SD, where he spent the next seven years. He received a certificate from the Wilmot School system for completion of academic studies.

In 1996 Eric moved to Watertown. In 1998 Eric started working at County Fair Foods as a greeter and was employed there for 10 years. Eric is most remembered for his incredible smile, great sense of humor and uncanny way of remembering names. Eric was always happy and made friends easily. He enjoyed spending time with his friends watching wrestling, football, basketball and of course Eric was the biggest and best Watertown Arrows fan. He also was an avid Green Bay Packers fan and made everyone aware of that.

Greeting people at County Fair was Eric's love; he loved to make people smile and always said "have a nice day". Eric was most proud of purchasing his own brand new home in 2007, and loved living independently. He invited everyone to his house and always gave the grand tour. He is missed by all his family and friends but will stay in their hearts.

Eric was proud to be a mentor at Roosevelt Elementary School in Watertown. Reading and helping the elementary school children each week was his highlight. He was always anxious to go to Roosevelt.
